Take the vaccine permission form home and	
talk about it with your parent or guardian.	
Bring the signed form back to school.	
The nurses at your local health unit can

6. What should I do on vaccination day?	
Make sure to wear short sleeves and eat	
breakfast.	
7. What happens on vaccination day?	
Public health nurses come to your school to	
give the vaccines.	
First, the nurse will ask you a few questions	
about how you're feeling that day and	
check over your signed form.	
Next, the nurse will give you the vaccine in	
your upper arm. You might feel a pinch or	
some pressure or pushing when you are	
given the needle. This will only last a few	
seconds.	
8. How will I feel after I have my vaccine?	
Lots of kids don't feel any different after	
getting a vaccine. Some kids might have a	
mild reaction like a sore arm or some	
redness or swelling where the vaccine was	



10min	Part 2A Describe the 4 letters of the CARD system and give an example of each	 given. The nurses will make sure you're feeling good before you go back to class 9. What if I am afraid of needles If you're afraid of needles, you're not alone. It's normal to feel anxious or worried about shots. In the next part of the lesson, you will learn what you can do to make shots more comfortable and make immunization day easier. SCRIPT: If you're nervous about getting vaccinated, you're not alone. It's normal to feel anxious, scared, or worried about shots. In this part of the lesson, you will learn how to use the CARD system (Comfort, Ask, Relax, Distract) to make shots more comfortable and make vaccination day easier. In this next video, Angelo tells you all you need to know about using the CARD system. PLEASE NOTE: This video shows a few children getting a vaccine (needle). Any students who might not like to watch this can look away and just listen. The children shown in the video are fine and not scared at all. Getting a needle only takes a few seconds. 7 min 46 sec. 3 min	Part 2B Describe the 4 letters of the CARD system and give an example of each	 With immunization day coming up at school, the CARD system puts the power in your hands to handle your shots like a champ! Ask yourself: How will I be comfortable? What will I ask the nurse? What will I do to relax and stay calm? What distractions will I use? 	



		Remember, you choose which cards you want to use on immunization day. The nurse wants to help you. So, tell the nurse if you are feeling worried or anxious. 7-10min min	Part 3 Describe what is HPV	 HPV Vaccine One of the vaccines you'll be receiving is the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine. It protects against cancer. Depending on where you live in Canada, you will be offered the HPV vaccine sometime between grades 4 and 7. In this video, students in Australia tell you everything you need to know about the HPV vaccine. Please note: In Canada, students get 2 doses of the HPV vaccine. This is to make sure you have the best possible protection from the infection. Watch - 2 min 29 sec HPV vaccination for teenagers - YouTube Post-video review: 	
		1. What is HPV? HPV stands for human papillomavirus. It is the most common sexually transmitted infection in the world. 3 out of 4 sexually active people (75%) will get HPV at some point in their lives. Most of the time, HPV goes away on its own, but sometimes it doesn't and can cause cancer and genital warts.	



2. Why do I need the HPV vaccine?	
You need the HPV vaccine because it	
prevents cancer. The vaccine prevents:	
- Almost all cervical cancers in females	
- Almost all male cancers caused by HPV	
- Almost all genital warts	
3. Why is the HPV vaccine given at a young	
age?	
You might be thinking, wait a minute, why	
do I need the HPV vaccine now if it is	
sexually transmitted? Here's why:	
- The vaccine works best if you get it before	
you are sexually active and exposed to HPV.	
- Preteens have a stronger immune	
response to the vaccine than older teens.	
This means the vaccine works best when it's	
given at your age.	
Also, the vaccine is not free forever, so it's	
best to get it when it's in the school	
program.	
4. Is the HPV vaccine safe?	
Yes. Vaccines are very safe. Doctors and	
scientists study vaccines very well to make	
sure they are safe. Hundreds of millions of	
doses of the HPV (human papillomavirus)	
vaccine have been safely given worldwide.
